



Title: Real Context, Real Language: Authentic Audio and Listening Comprehension in the Second-Language Classroom

Presenter: Courtney A Cannon University of Nevada, Las Vegas

Abstract: This project explores the effects of incorporating authentic listening materials to the teaching of Spanish as a second language. The study focuses on developing greater listening comprehension in beginning-level university classes through the use of television programs, advertisements, and music from Spanish-language primary sources. Understanding of said texts will be measured via student performance in written listening tasks as well as in oral comprehension checks conducted in class. Cultural implications will also be discussed.





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
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
